Seeds planted, soil tilled, compost added, and, after seven years, our **Refugee & Immigrant Services Program (RISP)** is growing exponentially and bearing great fruit. In less than a year, the RISP team has added seven new positions and has applied to become a full affiliate reception and placement site through the USCCB, with expectations to welcome 50 new refugees in the upcoming year. RISP has outgrown its current space at the Springfield Community Services Center and will be relocating to a new location in downtown Eugene this fall. We are so excited for the future of this wonderful program.

Want to learn more about RISP's work? Don't miss our celebration of World Refugee Day on Tuesday, June 20th 6:00pm at First United Methodist Church in Eugene. We will highlight stories from our recent Afghan refugees who have resettled here and celebrate with music, food and traditional décor. In the last five months, our small but mighty social services and community center teams have received a super crop of neighbors needing assistance, and the yields have been record-breaking for our Agency. In just five months, from January 1st through May 31st, Catholic Community Services:

- Helped 554 households avoid homelessness by providing over \$2.1 million in rent assistance
- Ensured 2,517 households maintained their utilities by providing \$1.4 million in energy assistance
- Distributed nearly 15,000 food boxes at our two pantries in Eugene and Springfield

Amy is an amazing mom who has overcome many barriers, including suffering two strokes and a heart attack by the age of 40 and relocating to Oregon to flee domestic violence. Five weeks ago, our case manager (appropriately named Hope) tackled the great feat of getting the Johnson family housed with all the furnishings needed for their new home. Amy's mother passed away a week ago, the same day Amy was released from the hospital after suffering a seizure. Despite the difficulties she's faced, Amy has remained positive with her head held high!

Amy stated how grateful and blessed she is to have all of us at CCS in her life. We feel the same about you, Amy... blessed indeed!

It was after retiring in June of 2015 that Julie first volunteered for a CCS Christmas party. She was so impressed with how respectfully CCS staff treated the clients that she decided to fill out a volunteer application. Initially, she started helping in our Energy Assistance Department (where her fluency in Spanish was useful) before landing in Development, where she has been since.

Volunteering at CCS dovetails perfectly with her Catholic faith. Julie is a Secular Franciscan (Lay Order of Franciscans) and adheres to its main tenants of charity, benevolence and selflessness. Apart from volunteering, Julie and Kevin donate to CCS, "because what they do is important and there is a great need in the community. We feel it is important to give back."
